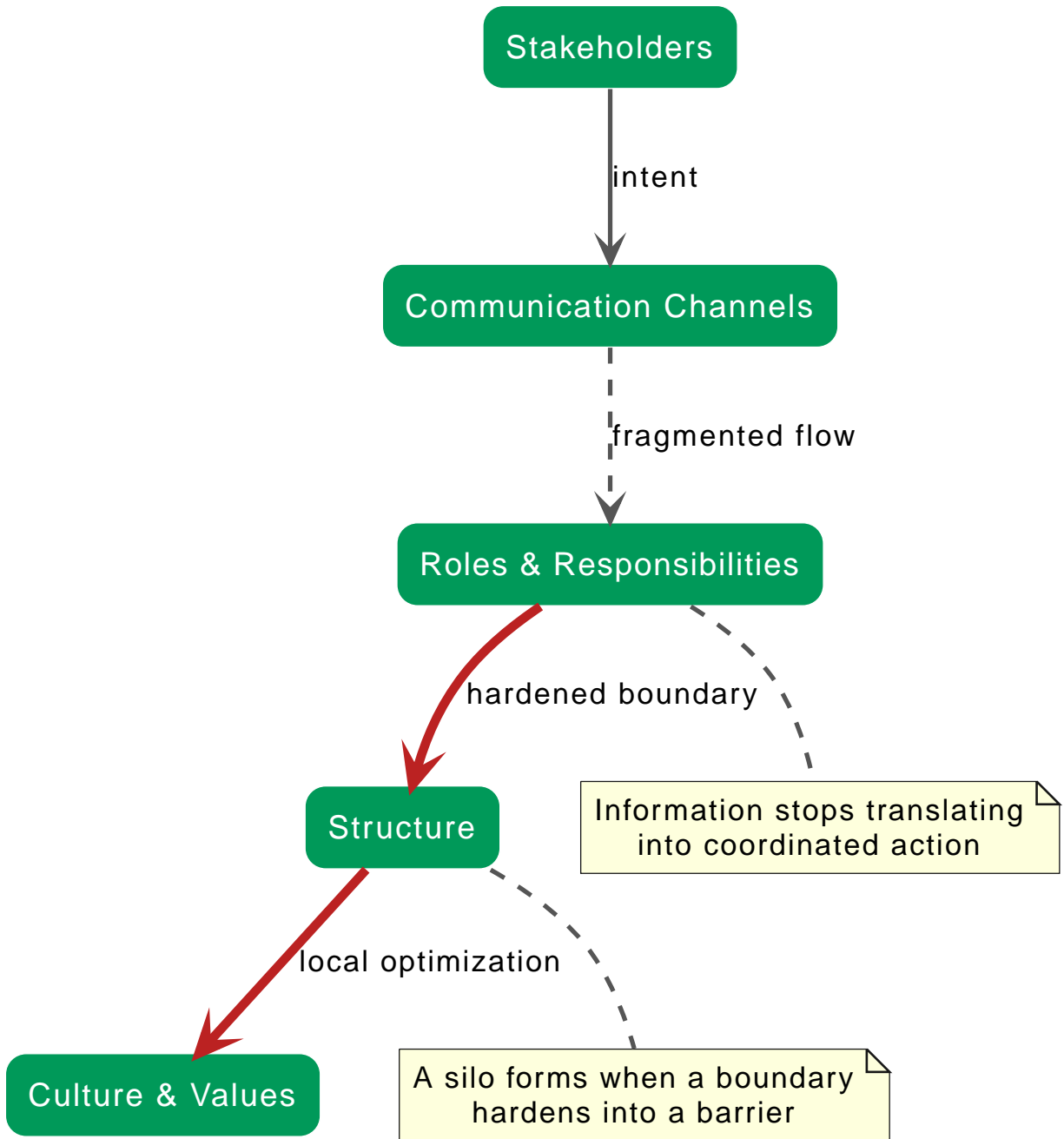
Signs of silo formation can include:

Identifying the root causes of misalignment is crucial for intervention. Dr. Darren highlights critical factors that contribute to this fragmentation:

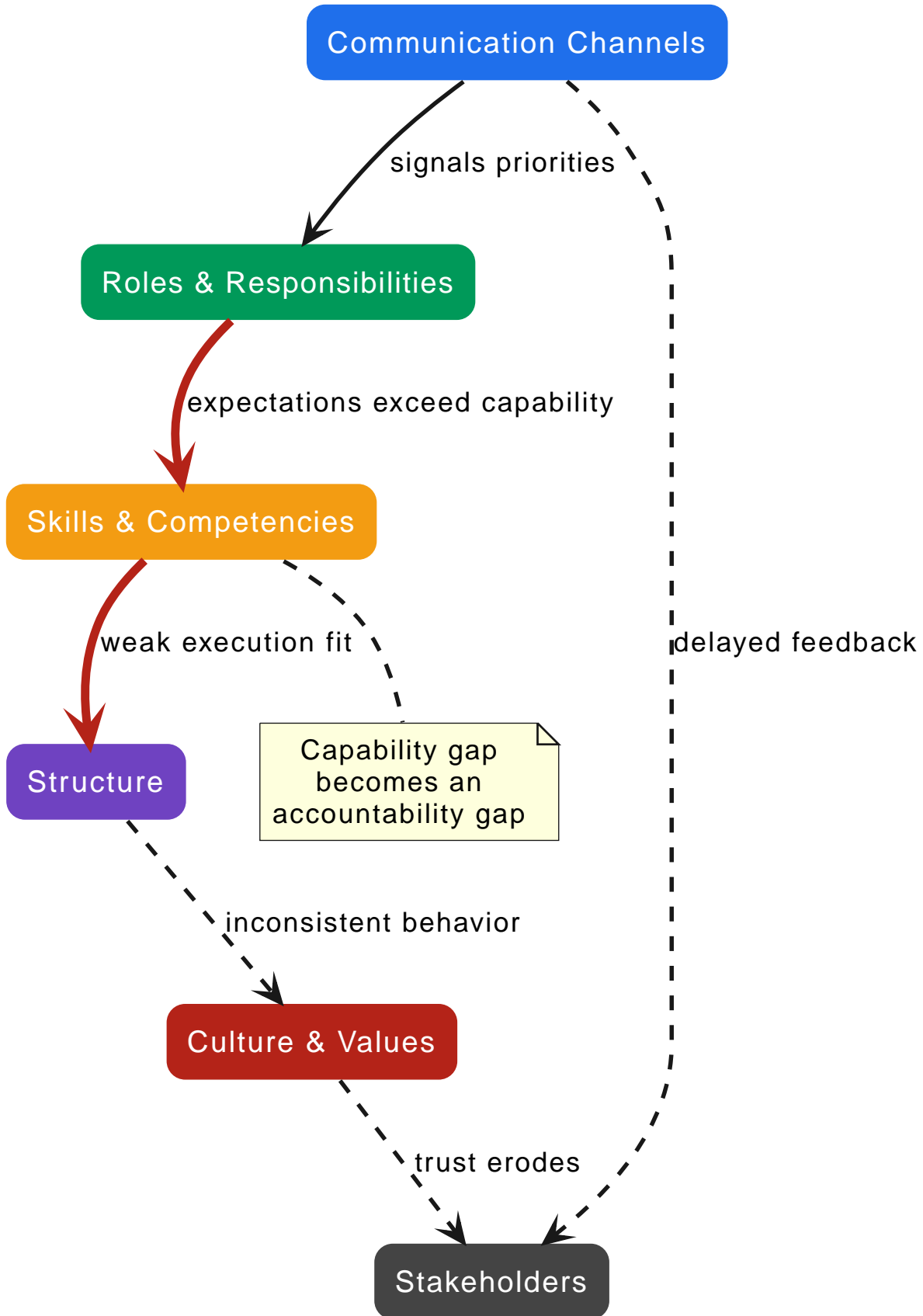
- **Poorly Defined Communication Channels:** Communication paths that lack clarity can

For effective transformation, leaders must understand how misalignment breeds silos, preventing holistic growth and responsiveness.



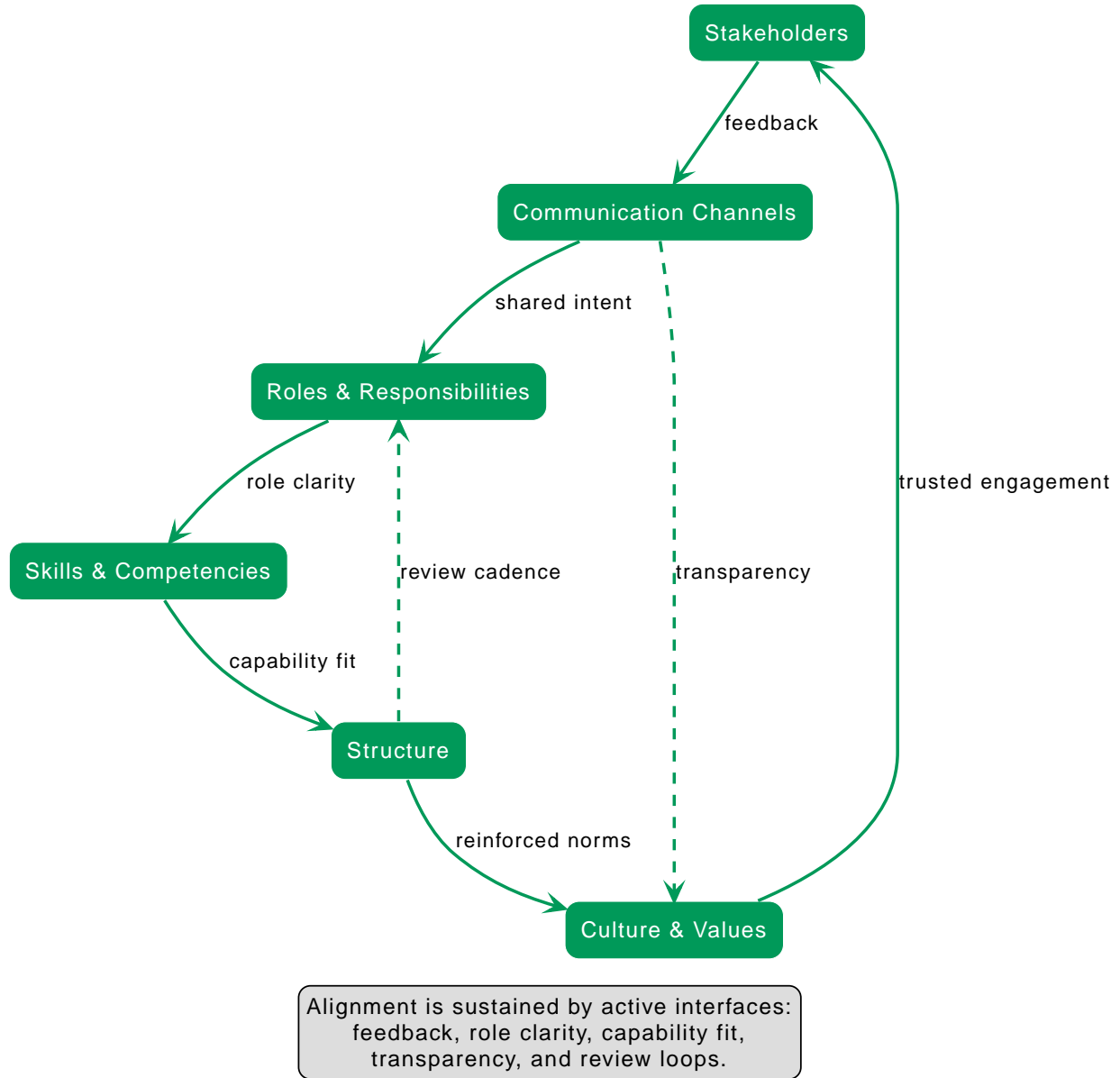


# Strategies for Alignment
